t least part of this industry buzz (Sover International recently pur her on the cover of its prestigious annual "Stars of Tomocrow" issue) is due to Ryan's careful management of her own image. Where the youthful stars of most other soups are rarely out of the gossip pages, gerting tanked up at parties (Covaration Street's cast, in particular, seem unwilling to turn down any event that promises free boose), Ryan is rarely seen at these functions. "I think it just comes down to what you're comfortable with," she tells Arear. "I just find that whole thing so insincere. When I first went down a red carper, I was so nervous and I thought it'd get easier after I'd done a few. But it's just really not my thing at all, going to awards and premieres."

Other than a brief period when she was linked to (and dumped) Futhallers' Wirer gonk Gazy Lucy, she has escaped relatively unscathed from the intrusions of the tabloids. "There'll be the odd shot of me walking my dog or scenething. But as long as it's not really on a regular basis you just think 'Whatever'. The best advice I was given was just to concentrate on what you do onscreen. You hope to have longevity in your career and if you sell out at an early age you're basically stack like that."

Conversely, she is bluntly dismissive of celebs who constantly complain about press intrusion while simultaneously feeding the paparazzi crocodile. Tim sorry, but you really can avoid it if you don't want to be photographed. I go to Nobu with my boyfriend and there's no press around – bot if you set it up then you will get papped. I could probably quadruple my wages if I sold our, but then you're crossing that line. Basically, if you walk around like a normal

person, you get treated like a normal person."

This kind of no-nonsense manurity makes it easy to forget just how young Ryan is — she still lives with her parents in Enfield (although is about to buy her own flat) and briefly gushes about her ougoing relationship with her "first serious boyfriend". "I was saying to my friend, "I never meet anyone and they're all arseboles anyway." And she said she knew this guy who liked me, but he didn't watch the show. We met and clicked and it was really effortless. He wasn't insecure or in awe of me or anything."

While most of her time is easen up by the show's 12-hours-a-day, six-days-a-week schedule, she displays a pleaningly esoteric familiarity with London's theatres, citing David Marnet's Sexual Powerity In Chicago and Greek gorefest Mails as recently highlights. (Unforcumately, this is also the point in the conversation where Arma's Pygoulius-esque dreums of taking her away from the signalor of Walford and turning her into a "lady" begin to fade.)

While this is all perfectly sensible, one suspects that the experience of being thrust into the public eye so young is what pur Ryan off the more public side of being a celebrity. "If you go into a soap you suddenly become a known face overnight. Everyone is aware of you and people assume that you earn loads of money and everything's so great." With little professional acting experience beyond "a gala performance at the Palladium with Wayne Sleep", the 16-year-old was suddenly at the centre of the BBC's most high profile show. "My parents weren't in the business so they had no idea of what it would entail," she recalls. "And you're still growing up, yeare still finding things out about yourself. You're not really an adult you're still a child - but you've been put in this adult environment and it's a real shock. I had a very idullic view of life when I came into it, and you seen realise that you have to stand up for yourself. You want to be everyone's friend, and you want everyone to get on, but things just don't work like that sometimes."

It seems like much of this was grounded in the level of physical scrutiny that any famous woman fiods berself subjected to. "Before I joined, I was never really aware of bow I looked; and suddenly you're on the front of magazines and you've got people commenting about your weight and the way you look. You can become very self-conscious. Being on TV makes you look bigger – it just highlights everything.

entily. I was very unconfortable with the whole culture around it, but I'm happy with the way. I look now."

This is perfectly evinced by her cover shoot for Asyms, an exclusive for men's mags. Confirming that less scrupulous "barely legal" publications have "been asking since I was 16... and offering a lot of money," she held firm until Assw/X approach. "It seemed right to do it," she says. "And Rankin [the photographer] is a bit of a legend." There is an impending sense that she is the one "most likely" to get away from FauEnder and on to begger things, due to bec carece-minded focus, acting skills and lookswhich, one suspects, have the soap's contume department working overtime to drug her down to the dowdy level of her co-stars. "Twe got no qualms now about looking rough on screen and being shot with so make-up," she laughs.

She's equally evaluate about the kind of film roles that are likely to be offered to ber at first. "If yoo look at sceneous like Cameron Diaz, the's the ultimate blonde bombaball and made ber name playing that character in The Alach. Obviously you have to play to your strengths.— Is a ultimately you have to do other things."

So, while Area's draws of rescoing Zee from Walford and showing her a better life have rurned out to be complete halfs, at least she has a great life abrad of her. One that doesn't involve us showing her how to use wine lists and cutfery admirtedly, but a great life nonetheless. And we're happy for her. Honestly, \$\mathbf{D}\$
